

First of all: People who make this accusation are ignoring the "God factor" that is a part of the Old Testament account.

• They do this because of a deeper issue: They are sinners who suppress the truth about God.


... people, who suppress the truth by their wickedness, ...
Romans 1:18b (NIV)

Some distort the "God factor," based on false views that people have invented about God.

• Some even go so far as to accuse God of wrongdoing. (Apostate church-goers often do this.)

The "Old Testament god" was a mean ogre.
Definitely not a god of love!

Some deny the God factor," by reducing the Bible's message to the level of "religion." They lower the God of the Bible, and treat him as no different than any of the "gods" that religions have invented A likely story! All religions make that claim! What God told Israel to ... makes your god so special? • The truth of the matter is this: There is <u>only</u> ONE GOD, and he is NOT a "religion"! ... the LORD is God; there is no other besides Him. Deuteronomy 4:35b (BSB) *True* "religion" is an expression of *love* for the God of the Bible and for one's "neighbor" (i.e., other people) - James 1:26-27. (The Old Testament ceremonial practices, when done out of love for God, also qualified as "religion.") Any other expression of "religion" is false religion.



The true God, and his relationship to Israel.

- This God, the true God, is the God of Israel.
- This did NOT happen because THEY chose him. Rather, HE chose them, because of promises he made to their <u>ancestors</u>

He chose you to be his own special possession out of all the nations on earth.

The Lord set his heart on you and chose you ... the smallest of all nations. You were chosen because the Lord loved you and kept the oath he swore to your ancestors.

Deuteronomy 7:6b-8a (GW)


(Other examples: Deuteronomy 7:6; 14:2; 34:4; 2 Kings 13:23; Isaiah 41:8-9: etc.)

 Israel was <u>never</u> faithful enough for God to make such a promise to <u>them!</u>

This love was because of his oath to their ancestors, not because they "deserved" it.

This is the God, who made (and owns) the entire earth. This means he has the right to give it to whomever he pleases. By my great strength and outstretched arm, I made the earth, and the people, and animals on the face of the earth. I give it to anyone I please. Jeremiah 27:5 (CSB) • And he does raise up and tear down nations. He makes nations great and destroys them; He removes kings and establishes them. He enlarges nations, then disperses them. Job 12:23 (BSB) Daniel 2:21 (BSB) There is a moral responsibility connected to the land. All Scripture passages that give us a reason for God destroying a nation tell us that it is because of that nation's evil practices. (This may include mistreatment of Israel.)

· God did not give Israel the land of Canaan because they deserved it. "After the LORD your God has done this for you, don't say in your hearts, 'The LORD has given us this land because we are such good people!' ... It is not because you are so good or have such integrity that you are about to occupy their land. ... You must recognize that the LORD your God is not giving you this good land because you are good, for you are not-you are a stubborn people." Deuteronomy 9:4a, 5a, 6 (NLT) · Instead, God gave Israel the land of Canaan for these two reasons: ... it is because of the wickedness of the other nations that he is pushing them out of your way. .. The LORD your God will drive these nations out ahead of you only because of their wickedness, and to fulfill the oath he **(2**) swore to your ancestors Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob." Deuteronomy 9:4b, 5b (NLT)



When Israel originally prepared to enter the land of Canaan, they sent in spies to learn about the people. This is what they discovered:

Nevertheless, the people living in the land are strong, and the cities are large and fortified. We even saw the descendants of Anak there.

Numbers 13:28-29 (BSB)

(The descendants of Anak — the Anakim — were giants.)

The people are larger and taller than we are; the cities are large, with walls up to the heavens. We even saw the descendants of the Anakim there.

Deuteronomy 1:28b (GW)

We shall see that this was half-truth; and without the other half, they reached the wrong conclusion. Result? They rebelled, and were not allowed to enter the land of Canaan.

According to Moses, 38 years later, what the spies said was <u>true</u>.

....nations greater and stronger than you.

Deuteronomy 4:38b (GW)

Deuteronomy 11:23b (BSB)

....seven nations larger and more powerful than you.

Deuteronomy 7:1b (GW)

....nations that are larger and stronger than you, with big cities that have sky-high walls. Their people are tall and strong. They're descendants of Anak. You know all about them. You've also heard it said, "Who can oppose the descendants of Anak?"

Deuteronomy 9:1b-2 (GW)

The problem was that they omitted the more important truth!



They even started accusing <u>God</u> of wanting to kill them!
 "Why is the Lord bringing us to this land—just to have us die in battle? Our wives and children will be taken as prisoners of war! Wouldn't it be better for us to go back to Egypt?"
 Numbers 14:3 (GW)
 God threatened to kill them off, because of their rebellion – and they deserved it. But Moses interceded (Numbers 14:13-19).
 "I'll strike them with a plague, I'll destroy them, and I'll make you = Moses] into a nation larger and stronger than they are."
 Numbers 14:12 (GW)
 There would still be consequences. They would have to remain in the wilderness for another 38 years, until all those 20-years and older, who had seen God's glorious protection in Egypt and in the wilderness, had died. Only their children would enter Canaan.

Here is the "half-truth" that most of the original spies ignored:

• Had they paid attention to it, their whole perspective would have changed.

If the Lord is pleased with us, he will bring us into this land and give it to us. ...

Don't rebel against the Lord, and don't be afraid of the people of the land. We will devour them like bread. They have no protection, and the Lord is with us. So don't be afraid of them."

Numbers 14:8b, 9 (GW)

• This was the "God factor" – and with it, there would have been only one possible conclusion:

"We must go up and take possession of the land, for we can certainly conquer it!"

Numbers 13:30b (BSB)

They ignored the "God factor," even though God had already proven himself faithful! Then I [= Moses] said to you, "Don't tremble. Don't be afraid of them. The Lord your God, who is going ahead of you, will fight for you as you saw him fight for you in Egypt and in the desert." There you saw how the Lord your God carried you, as parents carry their children. He carried you wherever you went until you came to this place. Deuteronomy 1:29-31 (GW) In spite of this, you didn't trust the Lord your God, who went ahead of you to find places They did not trust for you to camp. He appeared in a column of the God who had fire at night and in a column of smoke during already proved his the day to show you which route to take. trustworthiness! Deuteronomy 1:32-33 (GW)

Without the "God factor," Israel was merely a group of wanderers who didn't have the capability of winning a battle in Canaan.
 When they tried to do it without God...
 They said, "We have sinned. Now we'll go to the place the Lord promised."
 But Moses asked, "Why are you disobeying the Lord's command? Your plan won't work! Don't go! You will be defeated by your enemies because the Lord is not with you. The Amalekites and Canaanites are there, and you will die in battle. Now that you have turned away from the Lord, the Lord will not be with you."
 But they headed into the mountain region anyway, even though the ark of the Lord's promise and Moses stayed in the camp. The Amalekites and Canaanites who lived there came down from those mountains, attacked the Israelites, and defeated them at Hormah.

Finally, one more consideration: Even their enemies acknowledged that the "God factor" was the reason for Israel's success. · Most of the Canaanites didn't repent. But they had more integrity than many of the modern-day moral fools, who choose to ignore or deny the "God factor"! Only fools say in their hearts. 'There is no God.' Psalm 14:1a (NLT) **EXAMPLE #1 – The Amorite and Canaanite kings:** [When they] ... heard how the Lord had dried up the Jordan before the Israelites until they had crossed over, their hearts melted in fear and they no longer had the courage to face the Israelites. Joshua 5:1b (NIV) MORE

EXAMPLE#2 – What Rahab (a citizen of Jericho) said to the spies sent by Joshua:

[She] said to them, "I know that the LORD has given you this land and that the fear of you has fallen on us, so that all who dwell in the land are melting in fear of you.

For we have heard how the LORD dried up the waters of the Red Sea before you when you came out of Egypt, and what you did to Sihon and Og, the two kings of the Amorites across the Jordan, whom you devoted to destruction.

When we heard this, our hearts melted and everyone's courage failed because of you, for the LORD your God is God in the heavens above and on the earth below."

Joshua 2:9-11 (BSB)

TIME TO THINK CAREFULLY!

 Considering the nature of the situation (which we have just described) ... do you really think Israel was capable of committing genocide?



Do you really think Israel could have marched into a land full of people who were much stronger, larger in size and number, and residing in fortified cities, and kill them off, so that they could take over their land?

OF COURSE NOT!!!

 It never could have happened without the "God factor." And when <u>God</u> is actively involved in the fight, the word "genocide" doesn't even qualify as a term for consideration!

The "God factor" is the <u>only</u> possible way Israel could succeed.

- They have become so wicked that I will no longer tolerate it.
- · You are to destroy them completely.
- But you are totally incapable of doing so.
- You will have to trust <u>me</u> to destroy them for you and through you.
- Otherwise, <u>you</u> will completely fail, and <u>they</u> will totally destroy <u>you</u>.

Israel's options:

- ✓ Decide they're strong enough; try it on their own; get destroyed.
- ✓ Decide they're too weak to do it, and refuse to obey God.
- ✓ Obey, relying on God, aware of their own inability, and succeed.

Consider the "God factor" in our own lives!

★ DON'T DENY IT! ★

(We're often no better than Israel was.)

Jesus requires <u>us</u> to do things that we <u>cannot</u> do, unless the "God factor" controls our lives.

We're NOT referring to opinions, impressions, or emotional "feelings" that could be of questionable nature, but to direct obligations found in Scripture, about which there should be no question.

How do <u>we</u> respond to such things? Are <u>our</u> lives controlled by the "God factor"? HAVE WE LEARNED TO <u>TRUST</u> GOD?
